We would like to highlight and celebrate one of our very talented students here at Elim - Mia Henning. Mia Henning is a competitive rhythmic gymnast who recently represented our school at the NZ Secondary School Gymnastic Sports Cup at the Bruce Pulman Recreation Centre on June 13th. She competed in the level 7 division with three awesome routines receiving an overall score which earned her the silver medal (2nd place)! Mia said that she "enjoyed this recent school competition as it was a nice change to represent my school where I would usually represent my club." We asked her a few more questions to learn more about her and the sport.

Mia told us that rhythmic gymnastics is a type of gymnastics which utilises "apparatus such as hoop, ball, clubs and ribbon. This is combined with different elements of dance and apparatus handlings on a rhythmic". The element of dance is the side of rhythmics which Mia said she most enjoys too. There is also a lot of commitment and effort needed to do rhythmic gymnastics, with Mia saying, "at least 11 hours a week of training is

required at senior competitive level to familiarise ourselves with new routines and apparatus."

As made apparent by Mia though, the hard work really does pay off! If anyone reading is interested in trying out rhythmic gymnastics, Mia recommends "recreational level as a start to rhythmics. From firsthand experience, both Counties Manukau Rhythmics and Howick Rhythmics are amazing, local clubs to try out this sport." A big congratulations to you Mia and all your hard work!
